Coffee with Kathryn E Jennifer McKelvie

I had coffee with former councillor Iennifer McKelvie a few weeks after she became the federal Liberal MP in Ajax. The first thing I asked was how she was doing. "Excited and a little overwhelmed," she said. "It's a lot of transition underway."

Jennifer said she had only planned to do two terms on Toronto City Council. "At city hall you could spend 1 percent of your time on 100 things and never advance anything or you can say these are my three files and work on those. My three files were in good shape, my list of things I wanted to accomplish was done or on track, and so when the opportunity opened up to serve our country in a new way, I knew I had to do it."

She chose to run in Durham because it was "a good fit." Her father and several aunts live there, her son goes to Durham College, and the riding has similar issues to Scarborough-Rouge Park.

Jennifer's three priority files at City Council have been ravines, climate action and the Eglinton East LRT. "I really championed for the ravines, and working alongside former environment minister Catherine McKenna we created the natural infrastructure



fund. That was a \$20 million investment in The Meadoway and the ravines. We also repaired the trails down on the waterfront, especially to the west of the Highland Creek bridge."

On the climate action file, she said, "We developed a resilience strategy to be prepared for the impacts of climate change, and created a carbon budget where every department reports not just on their financials, but also on their emissions." Toronto had lots of firsts and bests while she was councillor, including the largest fleet of elec-

Jennifer's third file was the Eglin-

ton East LRT. She worked with the mayor's office to negotiate the deal to get the province to pay for the Scarborough subway, which freed up the money the city was going to put into it. This was then reallocated to the Eglinton East LRT. Now \$1.2 billion is dedicated to that project.

Jennifer said she has taken these three priorities as far as she can municipally. They now need federal or provincial funding to proceed.

Locally, Jennifer wanted to advance two big infrastructure projects. One was the Port Union Rd. widening, which should be complete by year

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end. The second was the Rouge Valley Community Recreation and Child Care Centre at Conlins, which should open in the fall.

She's also proud of all the playground upgrades she instigated in our community at Port Union Common, Bill Hancox and Wanita parks, and the resurfacing of the Charlottetown tennis court.

The last thing Jennifer launched was the community safety teams in the Kingston Rd./Morningside area to help people with homelessness, addictions and mental health. So far there's been an 11% reduction in minor crimes and a 23% reduction in the amount of time police are spending in the area.

"My list is complete," Jennifer said. "It's time for someone with new ideas and a new list of things they want to do." She will be missed here in Centennial, but we wish her all the best in her new role as the Member of Parliament for Ajax.

Staff will remain in the new constituency office at 382 Old Kingston Rd., which is open 9 to 5 on Tuesdays and Thursdays. You can also call them at 416-338-3771 or email ward25@ toronto.ca. A byelection to replace Jennifer will be held in the fall.



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Looking Back

Centennial had Canada Day parades from 1956 to 2015

Parades and field days are just some of the events we associate with July 1 in Canada. These traditions also have a rich history in the Centennial community. I recently looked through past issues of the Scarborough Mirror to see how our neighbourhood's commemoration of Canada Day, formally known as Dominion Day, has changed over the decades.

From 1956 to 2015, Highland Creek's Royal Canadian Legion Branch 258 delighted spectators with parades each July 1, becoming one of Toronto's longest-running Canada Day attractions. The parade began at Centennial Road Iunior Public School and ended at the former Legion building on Lawson Road.

In 1963, Scarborough's Professional Firefighters Boys Band marked their third birthday with a trophy for smartness and uniform marching. In 1966, the parade received a visit from the winner of Highland Creek's Miss Dominion Day competition, 19-year-old Shirley Wray. Wray and her princesses, Joyce Percey and Norma Ruddell, were accompanied by the Firefighters Drum Corps and Legion Pipe Band.

In 1969, more than 50 young participants rode decorated bikes and walked costumed pets alongside pipe

bands and drum majorettes. Other activities included a game of the Irish stick-and-ball sport, camogie, and performances by Frances Gibbon's Irish Dancers.

By the mid-1970s, soap box derby fever had swept the community. In 1975, the West Hill Kinsmen Club and Scarborough Committee on Parks and Entertainment held their first soap box derby in years as part of Scarborough's Canada Week. The derby was highly anticipated in Centennial, with students at Highland Creek Public School spending months constructing go-karts and

After much preparation, competitors aged 8 to 12 took the wheel on June 28, zooming down Old Kingston Road to Highland Creek Park in the hopes of winning prizes for the safest car, fastest car, and best car design. Karl Steffler of Mississauga emerged victorious, winning the Class A Championship and the award for best car design. Scott Bremner of Streetsville took home the award for safest car.

With the 1980s came a defining moment in Canadian history. Dominion Day was officially renamed Canada Day in 1982. Amid debates about what it means to be "Canadian," Centennial's annual celebration promoted the Canadian spirit

of unity. In 1981, the Scarborough Liberal Association hosted a Canada Day picnic at Adams Park with baseball, races, free Canadian flag pins, a wet-sponge throw, and fireworks. For Canada's 126th birthday in 1993, onlookers enjoyed an appearance by the Legion's Colour Guard, as well as pony and hay rides, an antique car show, a beer garden, and a petting zoo. Festivities concluded with a live band and street dance.

This year, Canada Day at Legion Branch 258 on Morrish Rd. will begin at 11 a.m. with opening ceremonies. At 12 p.m., there will be stories from a soldier, followed by festive trivia at 1 p.m. A live band will take the stage at 2 p.m. Other activities will include Canadian Armed Forces Cadet demonstrations, MRE (Meal, Ready-to-Eat) ration tastings, a bouncy castle, and children's games.

Mortgage discharge fees

Still have a mortgage on your home? When you sell, your lender

will charge a discharge fee to remove their name from your home. These will typically be under \$1,000 – so not huge, but still worth budgeting for.

Mortgage prepayment penalties

This is good to calculate if your mortgage isn't up for renewal. Depending on your mortgage terms, you could have a prepayment penalty for paying it off early. For fixed-rate mortgages, this is often calculated as the greater of three months' interest or the interest rate differential (IRD).

Capital gains tax

Selling a primary residence? The good news is you won't pay capital gains tax. Selling an investment property is different. 50% of the profit is taxable (at your current taxable rate) which can have an impact. Looping in your accountant will help minimize taxes.

Updates and repairs

Want top dollar? Most owners set a budget for home prep. Ensure all the mechanical systems have checks and are all working. Small fixes — like paint touch-ups & lighting upgrades can go a long way. Spending some \$\$ on kitchens and bathrooms before listing may be worth it, but make sure you're discussing the best colours, finishes and styles with a pro to appeal to the most buyers.

For the love of that popular new sport called pickleball

Pickleball, often described as a combination of tennis, badminton and ping pong, has recently become one of the most popular sports in North America. Many wonder how this unique sport, which has captivated the interest of all ages and skill levels, came to be.

According to various research sites, pickleball began on Bainbridge Island, Washington, in 1965. The story goes that Joel Pritchard, a state representative at the time, and his neighbours were looking for a way to entertain their families on a Saturday afternoon. Unable to find their usual badminton equipment, they improvised with a set of ping pong paddles, a perforated plastic ball, and a lowered badminton net. Little did they know that this impromptu game would soon become one of the fastest-growing sports in the world.

The next challenge was what to name this new "sport" that they created. According to Nick Brinkerhoff, a writer/producer at Sporting News, one theory is that it was named after Pritchard's dog, Pickles, who would chase after the stray balls during games. Others claim that it was Pritchard's wife, Joan, who named the game after a "pickle boat," which refers to a boat comprised of leftover or

mismatched crew members. "It makes for a fitting name since the game was born out of using leftover equipment from other sports," says Nick.

Centennial resident Shaun De-Souza started playing pickleball in 2022 after he experienced a torn achilles tendon while playing tennis. He quickly became hooked on the sport, and has just completed his coaching certification in April. Shaun describes pickleball as being an easier sport to learn than tennis. With the paddle being so lightweight, "it's like playing ping pong on a badminton court with some tennis strategy."

For those who would like to play the game but don't know where to start, hiring a certified coach like Shaun creates a safe space to learn and experiment. On average, it only takes four to five sessions to learn the game. Katrina Deverell describes how she lacked confidence when she began playing pickleball but she quickly developed the skills and self-assurance to enjoy the game fully. Another pickleball player, Heather Lemieux, who was new to racquet sports, appreciates how her coach, Shaun, "focused on safety, fundamentals and strategy."

Throughout Shaun's coaching experience, he noticed that people who haven't been physically active or who don't normally play sports, are surprised at how quickly they catch onto pickleball. By the fourth lesson, his players are often heard saying, "I can't believe I'm playing pickleball" with boosted confidence!

Of the many benefits of playing pickleball, improving one's physical fitness is at the top. The sport is also mentally stimulating and gratifying.

Another big benefit is the socialization it brings. Pickleball is an inclusive sport that offers companionship and a sense of belonging. The smaller court size allows players to be close enough to socialize during gameplay and interact with new people. Players who may not have known each other at the start of the game quickly form a social bond.

If you would like to learn to play pickleball or improve your skills, here are a few places nearby that offer free drop-in sessions: the Port Union Community Recreation Centre has indoor courts, as does Heron Park Community Recreation Centre and Toronto Pan Am Sports Centre. 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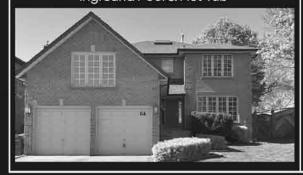
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Free and fee-based family activities in the area

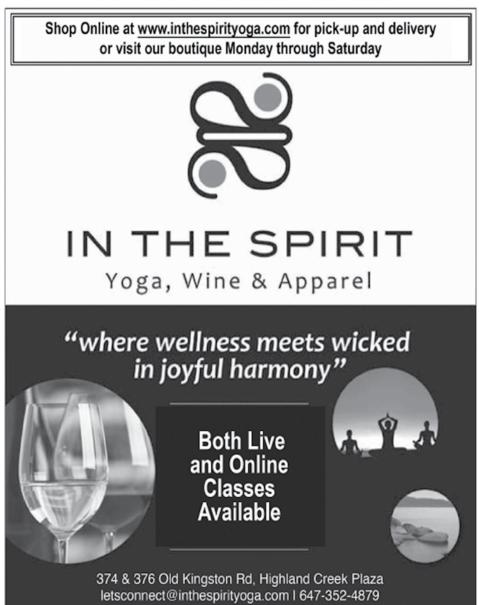

Not your average picture day at Centennial Road School

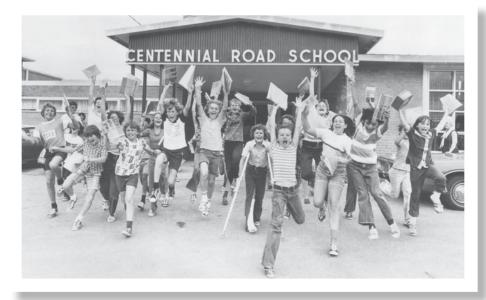

Picture day is an important tradition for students and parents alike. Parents brainstorm outfit ideas and schedule haircuts, while kids practice their smiles in the mirror. School pictures are important to many kids – after all, they are seen by everyone in the yearbook. You can also give them to your friends and, of course, your parents will hand them out to family members. With that many people seeing the picture, it had better look good!

But the photo on this page taken on June 19, 1975, at Centennial Road Public School was quite different from your typical picture day. This jubilant shot comes from a Toronto Star article called "School's Out," about Scarborough schools. These Grade 6 youngsters were delighted to participate.

The students came as they were, including 11-year-old John Gallop on crutches due to a broken ankle. Combed hair was optional. Notice the CCRA T-shirt at the left of the photo. On the far-left side of the photo wearing sunglasses was Bruce Geddes, the Grade 6 teacher, while Mrs. Ruth Banks, principal at Centennial Road that year, can be seen standing to the right.

On this picture day, students were already excited as the Toronto Star's photographer instructed them to take something from their desk ready to



wave over their heads as they jumped and yelled while bursting out of the school's front door. They were also happy to be graduating from Grade 6 and about to start summer holidays. Their photo was going to be published in the newspaper for everyone to see, a big deal in those days.

Centennial News was able to speak to two people who were part of the photoshoot 50 years ago. The Grade 6

before the modern subdivisions developed.

"The highlight and a big memory for me was leading a committee of teachers at Centennial Road PS to organize a mini-Olympic games in June of 1976 for our annual track and field day," Bruce said. "The celebration/event was based on the opening ceremonies planned for the Montreal Olympic games that summer.

"We had a supervised torch run by students from the Scarborough Civic Centre on Ellesmere at McCowan to the school playground where we held our 'games.' Special guests from the mayor's office and the Education Centre were invited to speak during the opening ceremony. It was certainly one of the fondest memories I have Centennial from my teaching career."

Notice the CCRA T-shirt worn by the boy at the left of the photo, and just behind him, wearing sunglasses was Bruce Geddes, the Grade 6 teacher. After two years at Centennial, Bruce continued his teaching career at various Scarborough schools retiring in 2001 from Tom Longboat Jr. PS as principal. He and his family lived in West Rouge for 34 years from 1988 to 2022. His daughters went on to attend Joseph Howe Senior PS and Oliver Mowat CI.

Peace and beauty found in backyard ponds

e asked Centennial residents to share their backyard ponds with us, and we weren't disappointed. Three homeowners invited us into their yards, revealing the lush beauty and Zen-like atmosphere created by their ponds. We learned these water features create an oasis of calm in a big city.

Sandra Itenson and her husband Angelo Bernardo built their pond as a Covid project. As with many hobbies, the pond grows every year. Sandra said the water feature adds a peaceful element to the yard. "I'll come out here with my cup of tea, or a glass of wine after work, and just decompress. The sound of the running water is really nice." Frogs have taken up residence and they sing a croaking chorus. "We've had frogs for three years now," Sandra said. "I don't know where they came from — they just arrived one day." Sandra and Angelo keep things green by using solar panels to run the pumps. They only use natural enzymes to keep the pond clear, steering away from chemicals if possible. Sandra belongs to a Facebook group where she meets other pond owners who share plants and maintenance tips.

When Nancy Green and her husband moved into Centennial 30 years ago, Nancy took one look at the backyard and knew she wanted to add a pond. "There was a corner with a depression, so I dug the first one myself." After starting a second career as a landscape designer 18 years ago, Nancy had a larger pond professionally installed. The couple has never looked back. "We sit here by the water in our Muskoka chairs with a glass of wine and a fire going; it's like being at a cottage," she said. "It's so peaceful." The pond contains goldfish that don't need feeding because the natural ecosystem of moss and water lilies provides for them. Once in a while, minks come from the lake and clean out the fish, which is why the Greens don't buy expensive koi.

Sue Thorne and her husband Frank De-Leo inherited their large pond when they moved to Centennial almost five years ago. What was originally a swimming pool had been converted by the previous owners into a backyard paradise. "When we looked at the house I thought 'I don't really want a pond," recalled Sue. "But it was so beautiful. The perennials they put in were outstanding." Sue and Frank quickly became pond converts, and have since installed their own small pool. Over the years a variety of wildlife has made use of the pond including ducks, frogs and a great blue heron. Recently Sue spotted turkey vultures weighing down the branch of a nearby tree. Sue says the pond looks best at night when the waterfall and surrounding rocks glow from artfully-placed lighting.

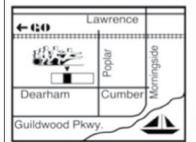

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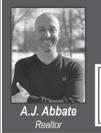

Bike Share Toronto offers a way to explore new areas What's happening

After the long winter we've had, followed by a cold, wet spring, people are naturally looking forward to summer! What better way to enjoy the muchanticipated sunshine than getting outdoors and exploring our amazing city - on a bike!

Many people don't know about a bike share program that we have in our own backyard! It's called "Bike Share Toronto" and it is operated through Toronto Parking Authority. It offers convenient access 24 hours a day, seven days a week, to over 7,000 bikes and 680 stations across Toronto neighbourhoods. Bicycles can be rented for Pay As You Go trips at \$0.12 per minute or other rental options from automated stations or "docking stations."

Nearby Bike Share Stations

Right here in Centennial and in our neighbouring communities, there are several Bike Share docking stations to rent and/or return a bike:

- Lawrence Ave. E. at Starspray
- Rouge Hill GO Station
- Waterfront Trail, behind and just west of the Rouge Hill GO Station
- Colonel Danforth Park, along the driveway towards the parking lot
- Morningside Park near the parking lot off Morningside Ave.

Guildwood GO Station, south parking lot

Imagine on a lovely day, going into Colonel Danforth Park with a picnic. You can rent a bike and ride through the beautiful park right across the two iron bridges and down east along the Waterfront Trail. Half an hour or so later, you can "dock" your bike at either of the two Bike Share stations at or near the Rouge Hill GO Station and enjoy the Port Union Waterfront Park over your picnic lunch.

Then you can stroll back through the park or take that same bike or another one to come back to Colonel Danforth Park to dock your bike at your starting place. Or, you can ride further afield and return your bike at Morningside Park. This would be a wonderful way to enjoy local park and trail treasures in our very own backyard!

Payment and Pricing

Renting a bike is quick and easy but you do need a credit card and a cellphone. You can purchase the appropriate rental plan for yourself from bikesharetoronto.com OR you can download the "Bike Share Toronto" App on your phone.

Riders can select the "Pay-As-You-



Go" option and pay \$1 to unlock the bike, plus a time-based fee based on the duration of use. To date, the fees are 12 cents per minute for a classic bike and 20 cents per minute for an e-bike. There are also Day Pass and Annual Membership options for Bike Share rentals available. Details on pricing and plans can be found at: bikesharetoronto.com/pricing

Students are eligible for a 20% discount for an annual membership to help offset their commuting costs. Reduced fares are also offered to residents living in Toronto Community Housing (TCHC) and to recipients of the Ontario Disability Support Program (ODSP).

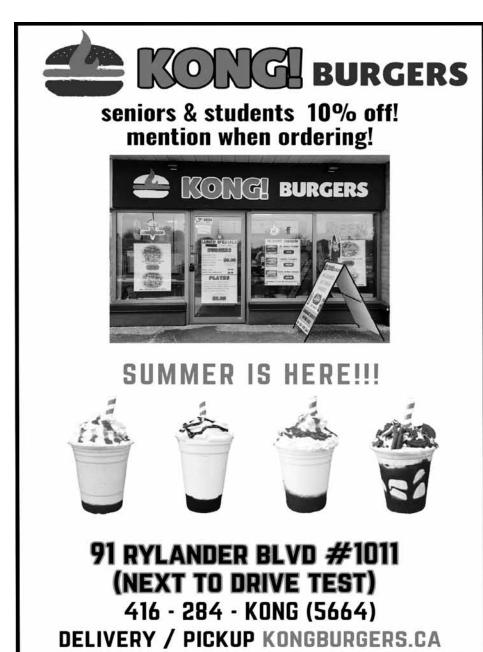

Memoir chronicles comedian's struggles

Spellbound: My Life as a Dyslexic Wordsmith

A Memoir by Phil Hanley

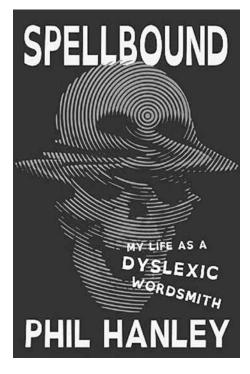

If you are unfamiliar with Canadian comedian Phil Hanley, you should go directly to YouTube and watch one of his sets. You'll find yourself laughing uncontrollably and shouting to anyone near you, "Come here and check out this guy. He's hilarious!" His signature "crowd work," a type of witty banter with the audience, exemplifies his intelligence and lightning-fast thinking processes. He keeps his audience in stitches.

After years of climbing the ladder in the dog-eat-dog world of stand-up comedy, Phil Hanley has made a name for himself. He's a headliner at the comedy clubs of New York City, is a favourite on the late-night talk show circuit, has written for a handful of feature films and has appeared as an actor in others.

Spellbound is not the book you would expect a comedian to write. Of course, it includes plenty of laughout-loud moments, but Phil's memoir is primarily a story about his lifelong struggle with severe, incapacitating dyslexia. He describes a heartbreaking life in which he despised school and prayed every night that he would "wake up smart."

Phil was raised in Oshawa by extraordinarily supportive parents but was victimized by a school system ill-equipped to help him. It would be many years before he was diagnosed correctly. Year after year, his teachers

wrote him off as lazy and unmotivated. Poor Phil fell further and further behind his friends, only passing to the next grade because his mother intervened.

Eventually, with the help of an exceptional teacher and some long overdue accommodations, Phil finally

graduated from high school. He is eternally grateful to his mother, who did most of his homework. Unable to pursue college or any traditional job that involved reading skills, Phil's life took many unconventional twists.

His first career took him to Europe, where he became a successful magazine and runway model. Although Phil claims he never had the body type of a typical male model, he was able to find work when some designers began to prefer their models to look like "sick chickens." He found the work excruciatingly unfulfilling and moved back to Canada after four years. By then, his parents had moved to Vancouver, and he settled into their spare bedroom.

In the following years, Phil struggled with mental health issues and substance use as he tried his best to find a place for himself in a world where he felt he didn't belong. Finally, he found himself on a stage with a microphone, a spotlight, and five minutes of jokes. From this moment on, Phil was hooked on stand-up.

His decision to write a book about living with dyslexia was driven by his desire to help others understand the condition. Astonishingly, Phil wrote the book and narrated the audio version, which he says was the most challenging thing he's ever done. I highly recommend the audio version, which features charming outtakes between each chapter, spotlighting how difficult it is for Phil to read continuously for hours.

Cabbage salad a delicious addition to your summer menu

Summer is nearly here, and that means lots of eating outdoors with picnics, barbecues and lunches on the deck. Cabbage salad is an easy and delicious dish to add to the menu!

It's a versatile option because it keeps for days, you can add or take away ingredients to suit what you like or have in the kitchen, it acts as a side dish, but can also be added to sandwiches or used to top tacos, and if you add some protein, it can become an entree salad.

The starting point for a cabbage salad starts with shredded or finely sliced cabbage. Choose green cabbage, savoy, Napa, or even red (purple) cabbage. You will get a lot of salad from one head, so start by using half.

Thinly slice the cabbage by hand or use a mandolin or the slicer blade attachment in your food processor. Next, add the additional ingredients. Choose as many or as few as you like. The amounts are approximate because you may like lots of raw white onion in your salad, or you may like just a few flecks of chives. Take the amounts as a suggestion.

The key is that cabbage is the predominant ingredient, and all ingredients are sliced very thin. Some can be prepared by using the large holes on the side of a box grater, similar to grating cheese.

Additional Ingredients:

- Carrot (1-2)
- Onion: red or white, green or chives (1/4 to 1/2 onion, 2-3 green, 6-8 chives)
- Bell pepper or jalapeno or chilis (½ to 1 pepper, 1 jalapeno/chili)
- Radish (3-4)
- Snap peas (6-10)
- Fresh herbs such as parsley, cilantro, dill or basil. But if you like tarragon, oregano, thyme, add those. (3-5 sprigs)
- Cucumber or zucchini (1/2)
- Apple or pear (1-2)
- Orange or other citrus fruit (1-2)
- Pickles or olives (4+ pickles, 8+
- Dried fruits (1/4 cup+)

And maybe a handful of something crunchy for topping, like nuts or seeds.

As for dressing, you can buy any number of varieties of bottled dressing at the store. Shake the bottle well before using and be generous with it. Add the dressing in advance and mix everything well. The salad should rest in the fridge for at least an hour before serving so the vinegar in the dressing can break down the cabbage a bit.

If you want to make your own dressing, here are two suggestions.

Vinegar and lemon dressing: Combine 1/4 cup olive oil and 1/4 cup plain yogurt or sour cream with 1/4 cup white

or white wine vinegar and 1/4 cup lemon juice in a small dish or container with a tight-fitting lid. Add ½ tsp each salt and pepper. Mix well or add the lid and shake well.

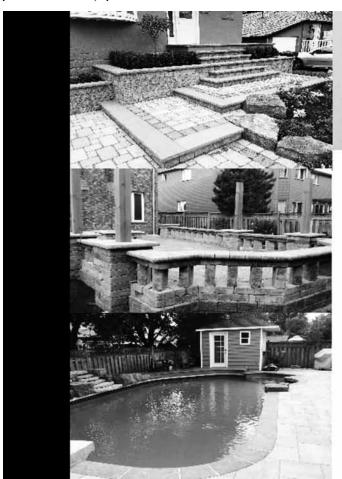
Creamy dressing: Combine 1/2 cup olive oil with 1/4 cup white or white wine vinegar and 1/4 cup lemon juice in a small dish or container with a tight-fitting lid. Add ½ tsp each salt and pepper. Mix well, or add the lid and shake well.

For both types, pour half of the dressing over the salad and mix well. Everything should be coated. Add more dressing, as needed, and mix again. Cover and refrigerate until you're ready to eat.

Go ahead and try variations of this salad throughout the summer by mixing up the optional add-ins to suit your menu. Enjoy!

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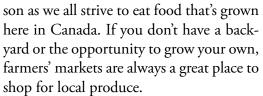

Many residents in Centennial planted vegetables in their gardens last month in order to enjoy the bounty of fresh produce all summer and into the fall. This is probably happening even more in our community this sea-



Fairly close to us, Malvern Urban Farm has two acres of land in the Finch hydro corridor at Neilson and Morningside. It allows 19 community farming groups to grow their own food, and it's going to be expanded by another acre this year. The main goal of this farm, which is now in its fifth year, is to provide a space for community members to grow food to address food insecurity.

Malvern Urban Farmers' Market, an initiative by Malvern Family Resource Centre (MFRC), is a weekly market at 90 Littles Rd. that gives some of the farmers an opportunity to sell their produce to the public. This market is open every Wednesday from 4 to 7 p.m. from June 4 until October 8. Some of the veggies you will

find there include: tomatoes, onions, peppers, cabbage, corn, okra, callaloo/amaranth (a leafy green vegetable used in Caribbean cuisine), beans, garlic, spinach, carrots, basil and beetroots. These are grown organically, although

they're not officially certified.

Also at the market, you'll find other community vendors' booths for things like hot food, baked goods, candles, jewelry, and hair and body care. All vendors and artisans are local.

You can pay by cash or by "market bucks." This is a program provided by the market that helps patrons in two ways. One, it mitigates food insecurity among market patrons with a little extra cash if needed. Two, it acts as cash for card-using patrons since many of the farmers don't have a credit/debit machine. The market bucks are either \$2 or \$5.

To add to the enjoyment of buying fresh local produce and chatting with the people who grew it, the farmers' market also has special event days: June 18 is Indigenous Peoples Day, June 25 is the Summer Stuff Swap, and on July 2 they'll be having their Strawberry Festival.

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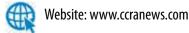
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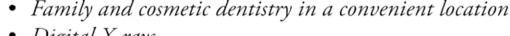




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
